Mike Mooney Instructor Development

Patrollers who want to become instructors in Outdoor Emergency Care, Ski &Toboggan Transportation, Mountain Travel & Rescue, or Avalanche need to enroll in the Instructor Development course to begin the process of becoming an instructor. This class is offered every spring after the end of the ski season to avoid the time conflicts that patrollers encounter during the ski

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season and counts as a senior elective. Participants in the course learn the principles of effective classroom and field teaching techniques and observe a variety of demonstration teaching models.

In response to student feedback we made some changes to the timing for the course, the schedule is to present the course in an evening session with the students required to complete a CD/DVD prior to the evening session. The evening session reinforced the materials brought forward on the CD/DVD and allowed for practice by the students before presenting their mini lesson using the foundations developed in the course. Ten patrollers completed this Instructor Development class in April 2014 and are now going through the mentoring process to become instructors. In our survey of the patrollers who completed the course we received lots of enthusiastic feedback about the class format. Check the region website for further information. Two courses will be offered; the first is Monday March 30th 2015 and the second is Thursday April 16th 2015. You can also contact me at mooney@geneseo.edu to register for the course.

In addition to completing the Instructor Development course, patrollers who want to become instructors need to complete the mentoring program with an experienced instructor in each discipline and be evaluated by an Instructor Trainer. Genesee Valley Region has been very successful in mentoring and evaluating new instructors and there are lots of experienced instructors who are available to give you assistance or advice on the instructor mentoring program. The region now also has a mentoring webpage that provides information about the mentoring process – you will find the link to it in the lower right column of the GV Region homepage (http://www.nspgvr.org) right underneath the Instructor Development link. Another new feature on the region website this year is the posting of lists of the requirements and responsibilities of instructors in OEC, S&T, MTR, and Avalanche in this region on both the Mentoring and Instructor Development webpages in Adobe Acrobat pdf format for downloading. The intent of these documents is to help potential instructors develop realistic expectations regarding what an instructor does and what the time commitments are to instruct in each discipline before signing up.

We have instructors from various patrols in the region with teaching experience in each of the NSP disciplines who will teach the Instructor Development course this year: Marcia Mundrick (Bristol: OEC, EMM, MTR, Avalanche), Mike Mooney (Swain: S&T,OEC), John Lawson (Hunt Hollow: OEC, EMM), Bob Andre (Hunt Hollow: OEC, EMM, MTR,

Avalanche), Glen Gebhard (Swain: OEC) and Pam Welch (Bristol: S&T, OEC).

The Instructor Development class is the gateway to becoming an instructor who trains new patrol candidates and refreshes current patrollers. These training activities enable the region to replenish our ranks and update our patroller skills. We invite you to take part in an enjoyable learning experience and join the corps of instructors in this region who contribute so much both to the patrols and to the skiing public.

S&T

We are looking forward to another great season of skiing and running sleds. With the season finally

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underway, our plans for the Senior S&T program are finalizing. We are looking at a pretty good-sized class this season, with members from around the region. We have our first class on January 4th, and there is still time to sign up. If you have any questions regarding Senior S&T please contact me. My contact info is on the Region website. Of course this program is for you. You will get to ski or board, and work on your technique to make you a better skier/snow boarder. Then we get to play with sleds, and moguls, and tweak those skills. By the time we have finished the program, you will see a noticeable improvement in your skiing and sled skills.

There are also a number of Division S&T clinics being offered this season. The Patroller Schools give you typically one day of skiing with a PSIA instructor, working on ski skills, and one day working on sled skills. You get to meet a lot of wonderful patrollers from all over the Division, and get great feedback from the PSIA, and some of the best Sled handlers in the Division. The Patroller Schools are being offered at Sunday River, ME; Elk Mountain, PA; Killington VT; Holiday Valley, NY; and Windham Mountain, NY. As usual we will have great skiing, a delicious lunch catered by Hunt Hollow, wines by Deer Run and Hunt Country, and, of course, great camaraderie.

In the Genesee Valley Region, in addition to the Alumni ski day event each year, Alumni receive Ski Patrol Magazine and the Ski Patrol Catalog from National, "Trail Sweep" on-line newsletter from the Eastern Division, "Valley Views" on-line newsletter from the Genesee Valley Region, and invitations to the local Ski Shops' Pro Nights.

For years, Alumni members have requested the convenience of online renewal. As many of you may have noticed in the National Ski Patrol's "The Sweep" e-mail newsletter, NSP has changed the method of renewing Alumni membership this season. Current Alumni members can renew their membership through the NSP Online Store, so the

national office will no longer send you an invoice for the next year's dues. Now you need to log on to the national website with your patrol number as your user ID and enter your national website password and then sign in to the NSP Online Store with your email address as your user ID and another password that you have to set up the first time you sign in. National office recommends that you use the same password that you already have set up for logging in to the national website. One important note for married couples who are both Alumni: the new computer system at the national office will not let you both use the same email address to sign in to the NSP Online Store, so one of you will have to create an alternative email (for example, a Hotmail account) to sign in to the NSP Online Store. You will pay the \$27 dues (same amount as it has been the last few years) with a credit card on-line and then national will send you your Alumni card for 2015. Please note that on-line renewal applies only to current Alumni members. Patrollers who are joining as Alumni members for the first time still need to send in a paper registration form and a check for their dues to the national office. Here is a note about the national Alumni dues that most people are unaware of: about one third of your dues is sent by national to your division and region to support their programs. The Genesee Valley Region uses its share of your dues to underwrite the Alumni ski day, so you not only get national but also local benefits from joining.

IN MEMORIAM

Mark Whitford



The Swain Ski Patrol in upstate NY lost one of our key members when Mark Whitford, 56, died of cancer on August 28, 2014.

Mark contributed to his patrol and region beyond expectations as both a patroller and an auxiliary for his 26-year NSP career, functioning as both a teacher and leader to help fulfill the NSP educational mission. He began as an alpine patroller in 1988 and served in that role at Swain for approximately 15 years. A medical condition ended his ability to continue driving and tail-roping toboggans, but that did not deflect his determination to continue serving the skiing public. He maintained his registration as an auxiliary and continued to fulfill shift requirements in the first aid room weekly on a night that sees approximately 400 school children on the hill. As a veteran patroller, he set an example for younger patrol candidates as he worked closely with them during the training season and served as a mature and friendly role model inspiring them to complete their training. His enthusiasm and skill continued at the highest levels into his third decade of patrolling and he was recognized for his many contributions over his long patrolling and auxiliary career with the

awarding of the Eastern Division Outstanding Auxiliary Patroller Award in 2011.

Mark made substantial contributions to his patrol and to the Genesee Valley Region as an OEC instructor, a CPR instructor, and as an administrator on his patrol's executive committee. He served as an OEC instructor teaching at the region OEC candidate class, the region OEC refreshers, and at the patrol on-the-hill refreshers. He consistently taught OEC classes each season to the patrol candidates from the seven ski patrols that are enrolled in the region OEC candidate course and for many years he directed OEC modules at the on-the-hill refresher. In 2000 his local patrol voted him the nstructor of the Year Award for his excellent work in OEC and CPR instruction.

Mark was elected by his peers to serve as Patrol Secretary for four years. After his term was over, he was then was selected by the Patrol Director to be the Assistant Patrol Director for OEC on the basis of his prior contributions as an OEC instructor. He readily assumed this responsibility and completed important administrative accomplishments at Swain. These duties included scheduling and coordination of the annual on-the-hill refresher for the entire patrol of approximately 100 volunteer members and overall management of the patrol room, including first aid supplies, budget, inventory control, purchase orders, and replenishment of disposable material and repair of durable equipment. In this capacity. he also served on the patrol executive committee that works with management for the overall administration of patrol activities.

Mark was a certified American Heart Association CPR instructor and annually taught the CPR course for the region candidates from the seven area ski patrols who were enrolled in the region OEC candidate course. In addition he organized, administered, and taught four CPR refresher classes per year for his home ski patrol to keep the local patrollers up to date in their CPR certification, receiving a Yellow Merit Star in 2006 for his teaching activities. Off the hill, he also taught CPR for the Lakeville NY Volunteer Fire Department and the Livonia NY Ambulance Corps, both of which he served as a long-standing member and officer, and for the Conesus Lake Scuba Diving Association. His CPR teaching benefited many people who were in need of emergency services from his town's firefighters, ambulance crews, and diving instructors.

Mark is survived by his wife of 35 years Debbie, sons Mark, Jason, Shawn, and Kyle, grandchildren Maddie, Kian, and Rhys, and many other relatives in his large family. He will be remembered as both a friend and colleague by many patrollers throughout the Genesee Valley Region and his gentle manner,

constant smile, and sincere personality will be missed by all of us who knew and served with him.

Myron Crispino



It is with great sadness that the Swain Ski Patrol announces the passing of Myron Crispino, and his loving wife Anne, who were killed in a tragic motorcycle accident in early June 2014. Myron started his patrolling career in 1970, at Pinnacle Mountain in central New York, as a junior patroller. While at Pinnacle, Myron worked his way through the Senior rank, and with the encouragement of Jack Huntley at Greek Peak, became a Senior S&T T/E. When Pinnacle closed in 1977, Myron transferred to Ski Denton in Pennsylvania for several years before transferring to the Swain Ski Patrol in 1981. While at Swain, Myron served in many capacities, including OEC instructor, S&T instructor, Chair Evac instructor, APD overseeing the S&T program, Coordinator for Trail Marking repair and replacement, Awards Chairman, and Patrol Director.

Myron was never one to sit still. Several years ago he decided to become a dual registered Patroller, going back to Denton Hill as his secondary patrol. While there he volunteered for many of the patrol's fundraisers, including the summer archery festivals, and annual ski swap. He would volunteer to patrol on the day the Denton Hill Patrol did their annual On The Hill refresher in January, so that all their patrollers could be refreshed at one time. He would also contribute his decades of experience patrolling to the patrol and help advise on policy/procedure changes and updates, or on any subject where a need arose.

Myron has two sons, Matthew and Nicholas, both are patrollers. Matthew, who started at Swain, moved to Colorado, married Rachel (also a patroller), and is now a pro patroller at Steamboat. Nicholas also grew up in the Swain Patrol family, and is still a patroller with us.

Myron was never at a loss for words. As Swain Patrol Director, he constantly acted as a strong and

outspoken advocate for the well-being of all of his patrollers with mountain management and Region program administrators to ensure that everyone under his direction was treated fairly. He took the job of Patrol Director very seriously, and protecting his patrollers was part of the job description. After many long years of service to the patrol he was awarded National Appointment #9092 in 1999. Myron was awarded a National Distinguished Service Award, posthumously, in September 2014.

He wasn't afraid to have a good time, kick back and have fun either. He was happy to have a beer with you, light a good cigar, and talk deer hunting, tell tales of sailing across the Gulf of Mexico and eating fresh caught yellow fin tuna, driving out to Sturgis for the motorcycle rally and almost getting run over by a bison, or about doing laps around Watkins Glen in one of his Audi's. He would often regale us with tales of his home town of Corning, New York, or his annual ski pilgrimage to Steamboat to visit Matthew and Rachel, often dragging along other patrollers with him to enjoy the trip and some great hidden area skiing with Matthew and Rachel as tour guides. Even on the trips to Steamboat Myron would inevitably end up in the patrol room talking patrolling techniques, stories, motorcycling, hunting, or anything that came to mind.

Myron was always cool under pressure, and in the many serious incidents we worked with Myron over the years, he always kept a level head. That same trait he shared with Matthew and Nick. He always had a great sense of humor, even as he was transitioning to telemarking. He wasn't too graceful at first, and we would often tease him about needing to screw his heels back down, but he kept at it until he was good enough to patrol on his telemark skis. He still maintained his checkouts every year on both skis and teles.

Myron was involved in many activities in his home town of Corning as well. He served on the Corning City Council, on the Corning City Finance Committee, as Deputy Mayor, and as President of the Corning Lions Club. He put his financial experience as a Credit Union professional to good use in service to his community by volunteering to teach Corning High School students the elements of personal finance to establish their creditworthiness and avoid financial perils as they entered college or the job market. He had such an influence, that his presence will be greatly missed by many people for a very long time. Myron was a great father, husband, and patroller. He was a friend to everyone who knew him. He will be sorely missed by both patrols.

With over twenty years of Hunt Hollow service in the rust and blue, his big smile (and bigger cowboy hat) were fixtures on the mountain in its early years. Dick graduated from Cornell University Class of '53, Phi Beta Kappa, and was a member of the Alpha Delta Phi fraternity, also serving as the chapter Alumni President for several years.

Dick served proudly in the US Army and Reserves retiring as a Colonel with the 98th division (go Iroquois!). Dick was also a 30 year Eastman Kodak Company employee as a Manufacturing Engineering Manager in the Apparatus Division. Dick grew up on the water and was a boater/fisherman/waterskier/yachtsman his entire life. He and Ann cruised the Great Lakes and Eastern Seaboard aboard the Whitecap with family and friends for nearly 30 years. He was a longstanding member of the Rochester Yacht Club, where he was Power Fleet Captain and a mainstay of the annual Club Cruise for many years. He was also a member of the United States Power Squadron, serving as the Commander of the Rochester Squadron, and sharing his expertise in

Seamanship, Piloting, and Navigation with other mariners for years.

When the seasons turned the water to snow, Dick could be found on the ski slopes. He dedicated forty-one of his skiing years as a volunteer with the National Ski Patrol, earning a National Appointment. He helped build a ski slope with fellow students at Cornell in the early 1950's, where he first patrolled. He later patrolled at Ski Valley and completed his patrol service with over 20 years at the Hunt Hollow Ski Club.

We will never forget our family outings with him on the water, on the slopes, in the Adirondacks, at Alden Camps in Maine, and in our own backyard at Kirklees Road.
