Jeff Baker Lift Evacuation

There is never a dull moment in the exciting world of Lift Evacuation.

The '99-'00 season saw Doug Holler successfully coordinate a Division-wide lift evacuation seminar at Holiday Valley. All those in attendance brought their personal experience and concerns and returned with new ideas, solutions and enthusiasm. The event inspired new practices and positive improvements at each of the participating mountains.

It was not a moment too soon for the Ski Valley Ski Patrol. A pesky, weight sensing, overload safety on the graying chair, gave the intrepid evac team lots of practice this winter.

The first evacuation of the season, (yes Virginia, he said the FIRST evacuation), was made more sporting as the temperature was 5° F, with a brisk wind. As luck would have it, the lift was fully loaded, the club having sponsored a race day with lots of athletes in speed suits. [Note: (Lycra) + (-15° F wind chill) = damn cold skiers]. The team worked well together and delivered all safely to the snow, with a few skiers narrowly avoiding hypothermia. After a careful examination of the lift and minor adjustments, (plus some crossed fingers, incense burning and a chicken sacrifice, 'er, barbecue) the lift was restarted. It ran smoothly until a week later, nearly to the minute, when the patrol was provided with yet another opportunity to hone their lift evacuation skills. Any wrinkles had been ironed out in the previous week's practice, the weather was more cooperative, and all went well. By the end of the second event, the skiing public showed a renewed interest in the surface lifts. Mountain

management, along with the help of the patrol, dug deeper and found a drive train component which appeared physically sound, but, in bench tests, had lost it's punch. Adequate safety backups existed to prevent a catastrophic failure, but a lift evacuation is clearly not the exercise of choice for any patrol. Both evacuations were executed with professionalism and efficiency giving the patrol a lot to be proud of.

As any group worth their salt would do, the Ski Valley patrol reviewed their experiences critically and identified areas of need. The result was to take steps to: add another evacuation set up, increase the availability of radios for patrol use, improve the inspection and repair process for equipment, and review options in every aspect of lift evacuation.

Next season the goal is to have a less stressful, but equally interesting season. We hope to collect interested folks from the region and share a day of lift evacuation ideas and techniques. The session will require a host mountain, early enough in the fall season to make it possible for all to attend. Henry Williams Legal and Risk Mamagement

From the standpoint of legal and risk management, the year has been a good one with little negative activity. The Patrols are very alert to the legal requirements of protecting the skiing public. This consciousness is raised by cooperative and hands-on insurance carriers. Organization documents for all of the Patrols are in near-perfect order. Patrols are proactive, anticipating legal and risk issues before they occur.

The only area for some improvement is those pesky accident reports. Some people don't like the accident forms. If this is the case with you, please let me know and the Region will do something about the form. Remember when you fill them out: they are the cutting-edge of the litigation/liability prevention war which is on-going. Think law suit. Think three years hence.

Most of the individual matters were routine: inquires about fundraising activities on the hill, a question about the patrol exemption and whether individuals could take deductions, an issue about child labor laws, and an excellent patrol-day protocol from Ski Valley. Only one of the issues rose to the category of "major": the Ski Valley bankruptcy. Because of the exemption from taxation, it is important that ski patrol property be segregated so it does not mingle with non-exempt property. The Ski Valley Patrol has this issue under total control.

Two great things happened for me this year: the new Division Legal Advisor, Bob Scarlett, called a meeting of all Region attorneys last fall and it was a very productive idea-fest. In addition, I had a call from Bob the other day notifying me that Bill Sachs has appointed me Eastern Division Assistant Legal Advisor. To all who helped make this possible, I am very grateful: Jerry Sherman, Pamm Ferguson, Don Garman and many others.

Jim Mussgnug Avalanche

This year we piloted a new format basic avalanche course – a one-day format. This past fall, at the Eastern Division Avalanche and Mountaineering Instructors' meeting, we had an opportunity to share the format of programs given throughout the Division, and we found nearly unanimous support for a one-day basic avalanche program. Since the fall, our region avalanche instructors worked to revamp the program, with the challenge to keep the course fun, interactive, and educational, while meeting all of the Basic Avalanche requirements in a one-day format. We met our objective, with a fast moving daylong program.

The basic avalanche course was conducted on February 5, 2000 at the Immanuel Lutheran Church facilities in Webster, NY. The day started with overview sessions covering avalanche hazards and characteristics. Next, sessions covering weather, snowpack stability, terrain / route analysis, and human element were covered. An interactive simulation was used to demonstrate a tool for making data-based decisions to manage avalanche risk. Practical exercises were used to gain hands-on experience with use of rescue beacons, rescue plans, and probe lines. The outdoor search exercise was a success, with "Willie Die" being located under 2 feet of avalanche debris! The day finished up with a quick "Avalanche Jeopardy" session.

Overall, the one-day format was viewed as a success. First off, the integrity of the course was not compromised. The course met the objectives of a basic, overview program. The course also provides the foundation for those interested in gaining more in-depth knowledge from the 4-day Advanced Avalanche course. Additional interactive sessions were added to keep the day fun and interesting. Finally, the one-day format provides a quick means for those needing a senior elective, or for those just wishing to have a foundation in avalanche.

Discussions are underway between the avalanche and mountaineering programs to design a one-weekend combined Basic Avalanche and Basic Mountaineering course for the 2000 – 2001 season. Stay tuned for more announcements on this topic!

John Melville, with some help from Scott Wild and APD Jim Dudley, was able to get 4 of 6 new candidates through Ski Valley's Skiing and Toboggan Handling candidate test at the end of February. Congratulations to Chris Frank, Nicole McCool, Jeff Minteer and Todd Haran, who all passed the S&T Exam. Tim Scanlon and Peter Liao both showed outstanding progress throughout training but are not quite ready in the ski skills area. Both Tim and Peter have been asked to complete their OEC requirements this coming fall in anticipation of further on-the-snow training. All the candidates excelled in one area – Attitude – with excellent teamwork and a cheer for all as the test was underway.

Thanks to "Dogmeister" Ray Geary, the patrol was able to raise over \$300 in one short afternoon as hot dogs and soda were generously peddled on the deck at Ski Valley. Andy Baisch, Christina Hickock (high score senior skier and assistant dogmeister), Doug Rowe, and Meredith Osborne all helped to make this a success. Many hands make light work, even if it's just carrying hot dogs!

Elections for 2000 – 2001 ski season officers were held with Jim Dudley being elected as the new Patrol Representative (Patrol Director), Kirk Simpson returning as Secretary/Treasuer, Scott Rasmussen taking over Testing and Training, and Scott Wild being elected to the Advisory Board. The APD race was a close one; so close in fact, that it ended up a tie between Jeff Baker and Brian Walsh. Depending on our operating situation going into next season, we will have a run-off election to break the tie. Congratulations to all the new officers.

One other goal that our patrol had this past year was to try to help Ski Valley from a financial standpoint. CPR training and regional refresher training will be mandatory for all patrollers wishing to remain on the Ski Valley roster. Other possibilities for registration are also being investigated. My thanks to Jerry Sherman, Pamm Ferguson, and Henry Williams for their help or offers to lend a hand.

IN MEMORIAM



The members of the Swain Ski Patrol were saddened to learn on January 6, 2000, of the death of

Dr. George Lowell Emerson at the age of 83, in Belfast, ME. The former resident of Scottsville, NY, Dr. Emerson was Medical Advisor to the Swain Patrol for almost 30 years, from 1958 until the late 1980's, when knee and back problems forced him to give up skiing.

George's love of skiing brought him to Swain most Thursdays and almost every weekend, and his quiet, unassuming presence on the periphery of an accident scene or in the first aid room gave welcome support to volunteers who were dealing with a difficult diagnosis or treatment of an injury. He was always accessible to the Patrol as a resource for training purposes and on many occasions secured speakers and film presentations to help in training. He also recruited and screened a staff of doctors who assisted him as medical advisors to the Swain Patrol.

George Emerson was born in Bridgewater, MA, the son of doctors. A graduate of Harvard and the University of Rochester Medical School, he was a pioneer in thoracic surgery first as Chief Resident at Yale-New Haven Hospital and in 1948 returned to the University of Rochester Medical Center to become the hospital's first thoracic surgeon. Highly regarded among his colleagues for his skills as a surgeon, George was noted for his warm interpersonal skills with patients and his friendly bedside manner.

In addition to his love of skiing, George Emerson was an avid sailor and, because he suffered from allergies, especially hay fever, he would escape from

the operating room during the summer months to the family's summer home on Vinalhaven Island, off the Maine coast. There, he and his family would cruise the coast of Maine and the Canadian Maritimes aboard his sailboat, the Night Wind.

As the years went by, the summer respites became longer and longer but each fall he would return to his home in Scottsville near Rochester where he would resume his surgical practice and his other interest, cabinetmaking. George had a very complete woodworking shop in the barn behind his home, where he transformed cherry and other hardwoods into beautiful furniture for the benefit of family and friends.

And, of course, when winter came, as long as his health permitted, he would return to Swain Ski Slopes. We miss his friendship and his quiet, competent support in the First Aid room.

Predeceased by his wife Marion, Dr. Emerson is survived by his son, Jon Emerson (Eileen), of North Haven, Maine, his daughter, Lynn Storey Emerson Whitney (David), of Brookville, Maine, and five grandchildren.

Harry R. Stoneham, Swain Ski Patrol, 2-24-00

Dr. Roland E. Stevens, Jr., medical advisor to the ski patrols of the Genesee Valley Region, died February 8, 2000 at his home of apparent heart failure at the age of 88. Dr. Stevens, a prominent surgeon who specialized in occupational medicine, was a medical advisor on both the 1960 Olympic Ski Patrol at Squaw Valley and the 1980 Olympic Ski Patrol at Lake Placid and was a pioneer in the development of skiing in the Rochester, NY area.

Born in Hartford, VT, in 1911, he was educated at Phillips Exeter Academy, Dartmouth College (where he was a four event competitor on the ski team, excelling as a jumper), and the University of Rochester School of Medicine. After completing his surgical residency at the University of Chicago, where he worked with Nobel Laureate Dr. Charles Huggins on prostate cancer research, he returned to Rochester to set up his medical practice, teach at the University of Rochester Medical School, and establish the program in Occupational and Environmental Medicine at Strong Memorial Hospital. He set up occupational medicine programs for large companies such as Xerox, Wegmans, and General Railway Signal Corporation and also served the medical community in a number of administrative capacities, assuming the Presidency of the Rochester Academy of Medicine, the 7th District Chapter of the American College of Surgeons, and the University of Rochester Medical Alumni.

Looking to pursue his love of skiing in the Rochester area, he helped found the Rochester Ski Club in 1936 and

convinced county officials to build a 20 meter jump and ski slope complete with a rope tow in Powder Mill Park, which for several years was the only public ski facility in the area. After serving in the U.S. Army Air Force Medical Corps from 1942 to 1946, he returned to his practice in Rochester and to the promotion of local skiing. He helped to lay out the Brantling Ski Area and served as medical advisor to the Rochester Ski Club (1946-62), Bristol Mountain (1963-1970), and Swain (1970-1991) Ski Patrols, as well as serving the National Ski Patrol as Genesee Valley Sectional and Regional Medical Advisor from 1963 to 1995. In 1991 he was awarded the Distinguished Service Award by the National Ski Patrol for his many years of significant service to the skiing public.

Predeceased by his first wife, Mary, Dr. Stevens is survived by his wife Lois Wendell Stevens, sons, Roland E. III, Peter M., daughters, Carolyn, Elizabeth, Deborah, and Pamela, stepchildren, Alec, Gordon, and Fred Wendell, 21 grandchildren and 9 great-grandchildren.

An enthusiastic, outgoing person, Roland Stevens was always interested in the life experiences of his patients. As his surgical colleague at the university said upon learning of his death: "He related to the whole patient, the whole person. He was not just interested in operating. He got to know his patients as people."

Rollie Stevens lived life to the fullest, reluctantly giving up alpine skiing at age 86, but continuing to play tennis regularly and to enjoy the family's summer home in the Thousand Islands. He will be missed by all who knew him and especially by his many friends on the ski patrol.
