There's lots of news from the end of last season and the coming season will see many new changes to our organization. While the new division board of directors is working hard to get the new division

structure tweaked and pulled to make our division a finer place to be a ski patroller, our biggest and arguably most important job will be to make it seem like the Eastern Division of the National Ski Patrol, and the Genesee Valley Region is providing for you the patroller as it always has.

The biggest change for the coming season will be your opportunity to vote for the next region director. This huge change to the division by-laws is the corner stone on which your division board of directors is building its new home. Every patroller in the eastern division will now be part of the process of electing the division board of directors. As your region director I am now one of fifteen region directors that comprise the eastern division board of directors. I answer directly to you the patroller now, as you are the people who elect me. No more layers of patrollers between you and the division board. Each patroller has my e-mail or phone number, and I am a member of the board. The new election process will begin at this years OEC refresher. You will be electing a region director and an assistant region director this fall with those persons taking office in April of 2005. If you are interested in running for either of these positions contact the election committee to see what qualifications are needed and the process you need to begin to get your name on the ballot.

Another big task of the new Division Board of Directors will be to improve the delivery of all of NSP's programs to the line patroller. More clinics, closer locations, and a calendar of events on all division and region web pages so you the patroller can find the program or clinic closest to you. I know we all would like to keep continually improving as patrollers and the new board of directors wants to make this as easy as it can be for each patroller in the Eastern Division. Each region director as a member of the division board must chair a program committee. These committees will be set up for each NSP program and will include not only a region director but also the program supervisor, at least two section chiefs or assistant region directors and one or two members at large. The job of the committee and its chair will be to bring the voices of the patrollers who elected the division board of directors to the program

supervisors. The program supervisors will then be able to know where, when and who wants to participate in NSP programs and the Division will know from its patrollers if the programs are what they want when and where they want them.

All in all, a busy season ahead with a lot of new ideas to think about. Be sure to read further and check out the refresher schedules and program offerings. Snow is not that far away really and the new season will be upon us before we know it. As always if any patroller has questions or comments please send them too me via e-mail or call me and leave a message and I will get back to you right away. Instructor Development

Are you interested in becoming an instructor in OEC, S&T, MTR, or Avalanche? Or do you just need a senior elective? Maybe your Patrol Director has appealed to your better nature about how much your patrol needs more instructors. Perhaps you are looking for another way to contribute your talents to the sport of skiing. Some of you may want to increase the satisfaction you get from providing service to the skiing public. In any of these cases, the Instructor Development course is right for you and we would be happy to have you join us for two nights of interesting and informative classes to show you the ropes of effective teaching.

The Instructor Development class is offered each spring after the ski season is over to distance it from the many time conflicts that busy patrollers encounter during the season. It is an 8 hour workshop on effective instruction spread over two nights that counts as a senior elective. We try to model the principles that are taught and give participants a chance to apply some of the techniques. Talk to people who have completed this course in the past and I'm sure that you'll get a lot of good recommendations to try it out! We just completed a region Instructor Development class in May 2004 with nine successful participants: Kate Bauma and Linda Pazral (Powder Mill), Grant Fowler and Debbie Whalen (GV Nordic), Jon Hess

In 2005, we will offer the Instructor Development class on Monday and Wednesday nights, May 2nd and 4th. Those of us who have this experience would be happy to help out anyone in the region who wants assistance or advice on how to become an instructor or how to mentor or evaluate an instructor candidate.

The region is fortunate to have experienced instructors in each of the disciplines at various patrols who join me in teaching the Instructor Development course: Marcia Mundrick (Bristol: OEC, MTR, Avalanche), Mike Mooney (Swain: S&T), Glenn Gebhard (Swain: OEC), John Lawson (Hunt Hollow: OEC, EMM), and Bob Andre' (Hunt Hollow: OEC, EMM, MTR). I would also like to acknowledge the substantial contributions made over the years to the program by Merrily and Bob Hoover of Bristol who have just retired as Instructor Development instructors this year. We will miss their teaching and

camaraderie and we thank them for everything they have done to maintain to our esprit de corps!

Instructor Development is the important gateway to training new patrollers and refreshing current patrollers' skills. Without it, we would not be able to replenish our ranks or keep our skills up to date. Come for an enjoyable learning experience and join the corps of instructors in the region who contribute so much to ski patrolling and the skiing public.

Bottom Line, Skip successfully led a very busy awards team that was very productive for our hard working GVR members. When you see him, pat him on the back and say thanks. It's OK to remind him I still owe him a beer.

Skip has left the awards committee in good shape. My plans for the committee will be to continue to improve the award "consciousness" of the GVR patrollers. It is a program that relies on everyone in the region to be successful - the award nominees come from you. To improve the region awareness I plan on a fall meeting with Patrol Directors and Region advisors to discuss their role in the program. In addition, I will be working to make the program less "mysterious" so that everyone feels comfortable suggesting an award. I also intend to increase slightly the number of people sitting on the committee. This should help lighten the load for everyone and help award submission turnaround time.

The awards process will not be changed much, if any. The committee will accept nominations for an award. The nominations should contain a succinct description of why you feel an individual merits recognition. The committee will then review the criteria and verify, with your help, that the award is merited and the criteria for the award is met. The award committee will then make sure the letters are written and all the paperwork is correctly filled out. One thing that helps the awards committee a great deal is having the personal data on the nominee available. Local patrols have much of the patroller data on file and it is much more readily available to them than to us. If you are not familiar with the awards available and the information required to submit an award check out the awards section of the GVR web page. There are descriptions of the awards posted and there are samples of the applications that need to be filled out so you know the kind of information required for any given award.

I look forward to working with each of you on this very important project that rewards the hard work of our fellow patrollers.

Bob Andre' Senior EMM

The Senior EMM program is an emergency <u>management</u> program. We expect OEC skills to be up to standards at the beginning of the program so that we can concentrate on managing more difficult scenarios. The actual program consists of you participating as leader or helper in scenarios designed to teach good leadership skills. You need to participate as a successful leader in four scenarios. There will be a minimum of 10-12 sessions available-attend when you can. Class start is tentatively Jan 16th with the final February 20th at Brantling. There will be a checkoff of basic OEC skills prior to the on hill sessions.

Bottom line - this is a fun, very rewarding program that teaches leadership skills and refreshes OEC skills while exposing you to variations on how to succeed in the real world with multiple patients, aggravated bystanders, etc. Everyone who goes through this program, pass or fail, has positive feedback on its value. This year's annual meeting and test program was run at Smugglers Notch in Vermont the first weekend in April. The snow and weather conditions were very rough, making it hard on everyone. It rained almost the whole time and much of the mountain was closed. Of course these are perfect conditions from the Certified examiners' point of view. Genesee Valley was well represented with Jeff Baker and myself working the test and Tom Wallin and Peter Meitius as guests. Jeff has accepted the post of Certified Program secretary. I know he will do a good job because he is a great worker and more importantly Pam Baker will be helping. I am now chairing the Patrol Management and Hill Safety Interviews portion of the test program. All 20+ interviews went very well, mostly because Pam Baker was helping me keep it all organized! It is a good thing to see the Genesee Valley working into leadership roles in the Division program. The best part of the test was the OEC segment of course. My personal favorite problem (which most failed I'm sorry to report) was an on slope electrocution in the middle of a ground lift. It was really hard to find the entrance and exit wounds and treat the cardiac aspects. It was really fun for me to prep the moulage for the burns. I only burned myself a little bit. During the test I was lugging a huge bag of gear from the top that weighed a ton. I never actually looked in it because it wasn't needed till we reached the bottom and the electrocution problem was run. It turns out the bag had 6 AED's in it! The batteries were removed but they still were heavy. No detail is left out! Seriously- I believe that while the challenge and workload has not diminished in any aspect, the program has evolved from a rough and tumble struggle into a more accommodating gentler and manageable focus that actually allows for tremendous learning opportunities. More of our excellent patrollers should try it. I am always ready to discuss the requirements with any of you. Please call or email if you'd like more information. Here we are between ski seasons again. Just to make sure I'm prepared for any type of upstate NY weather, my garage is still filled with a full assortment of downhill skis, along with water skis, canoe paddles, and mountain bikes. Somehow those intentions to wax the skis before storing them away never quite materialize!

However, now is the time to start planning out your calendar for this year. Are you planning that ski trip out west this season? Are you considering the Senior Program? Has it been a few years since you've participated in a patrol continuing education opportunity?

Would you like to participate in the next Level II Avalanche Program? Then you may want to consider joining us at an upcoming Avalanche program. We are very fortunate to have a great group of dedicated and very experienced instructors in the Region. Many of our instructors are certified in both Avalanche and Mountain Travel and Rescue. We often alternate between offering Avalanche or Mountain Travel and Rescue programs in the Region. This allows us to best utilize our instructor staff and allow patrollers the ability to progress from Level I to Level II courses in both Avalanche and Mountain Travel and Rescue. Please contact me if you are interested in becoming an avalanche instructor – it's a fun program to stay current on the latest equipment and techniques in avalanche risk control and rescue.

Within Genesee Valley Region, we will be offering the option to take either the one day Mountain Avalanche Awareness course or the 1-1/2 day Avalanche Fundamentals and Rescue course. We have moved the dates earlier to try to avoid conflicts. The day long session will be offered on Saturday December 4, 2004. An additional half day session will be run on Saturday January 8, 2004 where we will spend time in the field studying snow pits, using rescue beacons, and conducting a rescue simulation. Those participating in the additional half day session will receive credit for the Avalanche Fundamentals and Rescue program. While both of these courses count towards the senior elective requirement, only the 1-1/2 day Avalanche Fundamentals and Rescue program meets the prerequisite requirement (as would the 2 day long Avalanche Level I program) for participating in the Avalanche Level II class. Enjoy the summer, time goes by quickly, and soon we'll be back at the Fall Refreshers, On-the-Hill, etc. OK, let's not dismiss summer yet. Besides, just think - the avalanche threat is low! Seriously – please do consider participating in an Avalanche Program this year. We're fortunate to have a very talented team of instructors here in Genesee Valley Region, and we guarantee you'll learn a lot and have a great time. Put these dates on the calendar now – the sessions will come up quickly after the Fall Refreshers.

With this newsletter, we are switching to a semi-annual schedule for Valley Views – Summer and Winter. Last winter, the region officers decided to do this as both a cost saving measure and as a way to better align the publication dates with the need to communicate information and patrollers' need to plan their schedules well in advance. The calendar at the end of this newsletter has all the fall events listed through the beginning of ski season, as well as some 2005 dates (such as the Senior

EMM and S&T evaluations). This newsletter also has news of all the awards presented at the spring banquets and picnics to date, and the results of the amendment of the region by-laws at the June 9th meeting.

On the calendar, note especially the dates and location of the region OEC refreshers. They will not be held at Honeoye Falls - Lima High School, as in the past, but rather at Honeoye High School in Honeoye. This was necessary to get the facilities we need, at a price we could afford, in the time frame we needed.

In other news, I have been tapped to chair a new Eastern Division World Wide Web Committee which will, as its first project, harmonize the presentation of calendar information on the division web site and all of the region web sites. This will result in some change in format of the Genesee Valley Region Calendar, once the final common format is set. It also means that all event information for each jurisdiction will be on one comprehensive calendar in that jurisdiction. There will no longer be separate calendars for OEC, S&T, EMM, Avalanche, MTR, etc. As I write this, as Division Webmaster, and with the Division Director's approval, I have reformatted the division calendar to match our GVR calendar, and have applied the comments of the Board from their meeting on June 19th. This includes color coding of the programs, but the colors will not reproduce well in the grayscale calendar in this newsletter; they are intended for web site use. I ask that as the region program advisors send me their calendar information, they try to do so in the common calendar format.

This newsletter will continue to be posted as a PDF file on the region web site. Right now, somewhere between 25% and 30% of the region patrollers have signed up to forego their paper copy and download it from the web site. Thanks to all of you. 



Figure 21 - Map locating Honeoye H.S., site of the Fall, 2004 OEC Refreshers.
