### **REGIONAL ADVISORS:**

### Nick Schiavetti Instructor Development

For those patrollers who want to become an instructor in OEC, S&T, MTR, or Avalanche, the Instructor Development course is offered to help you begin the process by learning about the principles of effective teaching. We offer an eight hour class that is completed in two night sessions and we try to model the principles and give participants a chance to apply some of the techniques.

The Instructor Development class is offered every spring after the ski season is over to separate it from all of the time conflicts that patrollers encounter during the ski season. In 2006 we will offer this class on Monday and Wednesday nights, May 1<sup>st</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> at Bristol Mountain. Flyers and signup sheets will be available at the Region OEC Refreshers and at the On-the-Hill Refreshers at each area for those who are interested. This course counts as a senior elective.

The instructors are looking forward to having another enthusiastic group of patrollers join us next year. We just completed the GV Region Instructor Development class in May 2005 with eight successful participants: Kate Belaskas and Chris Wendel (Powder Mill), Andy Brychcy and John Long (Hunt Hollow), Dawn Wright (Brantling), Glen Huot and Doyle Pruitt (Bristol), and Kathy Revekant (Swain). Talk to these people or any of the other patrollers who have completed this course in recent years and you will hear lots of enthusiastic recommendations to try this class out.

In addition to completing this class, patrollers who want to become instructors need to complete the mentoring program with an experienced instructor and be evaluated by an Instructor Trainer. The region has been very successful in mentoring and evaluating patrollers and processing their applications through the national office to complete their instructor appointments. Experienced instructors are always available to help out anyone in the region who wants assistance or advice on how to become

an instructor or how to mentor or evaluate an instructor candidate.

Several experienced instructors at different patrols with teaching experience in each of the disciplines taught the Instructor Development course this year: Marcia Mundrick (Bristol: OEC, MTR, Avalanche), Mike Mooney (Swain: S&T), John Lawson (Hunt Hollow: OEC, EMM), Bob Andre (Hunt Hollow: OEC, EMM, MTR, Avalanche), and Nick Schiavetti (Swain: OEC, MTR, Avalanche). I would also like to acknowledge the substantial administrative contributions made over the years to the program by members of the region staff, especially Region Director Mike Lord, Treasurer Diane Libby, and Webmaster Bill Gamble.

Instructor Development is the important gateway to training new patrollers and refreshing current patrollers' skills. Without it, we would not be able to replenish our ranks or keep our skills up to date. Come for an enjoyable learning experience and join the corps of instructors in the region who contribute so much both to ski patrolling and to the skiing public.

### Henry Williams Legal

There is now a form of General Release on the Region website which Patrol Directors and Program Chairs should use for all Ski Patrol events. It is intended to be signed not only by Patrollers but by all participants who may be invited to share our activities.

The form was prepared by Assistant Region Director John McManus, Instructor Development Chair, Nick Schiavetti and Region Legal Advisor, Henry Williams. It has five separate parts as follows:

- 1. The individual participating in the program or event recognizes the hazards of the activity, states that he/she is in appropriate physical condition and accepts the risk of any injury from participation.
- The patricipant agrees to absolve Genesee Valley Region, whether the Region or its agents are negligent or not. The participant agrees to indemnify Genesee Valley for any damage caused by his/her negligence.
- The participant grants Genesee Valley or its representatives the right to treat the participant, who asserts that he/she is covered by adequate medical insurance.
- 4. The participant states that the agreement binds his family or representatives.
- The release is governed by the laws of New York, and the courts of the county in which the incident occurred are given jurisdiction.

Soon we will have an instructor meeting to plan for next season. Keep and eye on the region calendar this summer for more information about the MTR 2005-2006 course offering in the Genesee Valley Region. Once again we will have early fall course registration.

### Joe Menichino Certified

This year's annual meeting and test program was run at Sugarbush North (the old Glen Ellen slope) in Vermont the first weekend in April. The snow and weather conditions were terrible. It rained almost the whole time- just like last year. This did not diminish the enthusiasm of the examiners, nor did it alleviate any of the work for the candidates. Genesee Valley was well represented. Besides myself Jim and Marylyn Nickerson, Tom Wallin, Peter Parker, John Long, Bonnie and Bob Andre and Marcia Mundrick all attended and participated. During the 3 day program we completed the ski test, toboggan test, evac exam, written first aid, practical first aid, bystander first aid, nineteen 1-hour-plus interviews on Hill Safety and Patrol Management, avalanche exam and low angle rope rescue exam.

As usual, the best part of the test was the OEC segment. This years favorite was an exploding Propane tank that burned a snowmaker. Pyrotechnics in the pouring rain, and it worked.... Rick Hamlin, our amazing Division Director was smart enough to bring a huge plastic tarp that turned out to be a life saver for working under to moulage and set up the OEC problems. No detail is left out!

Three of the 15 candidates completed all their requirements and joined the Certified ranks. I am happy to say the Greg Boberg and John Zajac, both from Holiday Mountain in Western New York were 2 of the 3 successful candidates. Small mountain folks can be successful in this program.

While the challenge and workload has not diminished in any aspect, the program has evolved from a rough and tumble struggle into a more manageable focus that actually allows for tremendous learning opportunities. 


Illustration 4 - Henry Williams receiving the new "Williams Award" from RD Mike Lord.

### **NORDIC**

The Genesee Valley Nordic Ski Patrol made local patrol history this season when it started up the south end of Honeoye Lake to the top of Canadice Hill and, and upon reaching that height, commenced patrolling Harriet Hollister Spencer Recreation Area. Patrol operations started on January 2nd and ended at the end of March with 2 feet of natural snow still on the trails. Harriet Hollister Spencer is the third Nordic ski area that the Nordic patrol now serves in addition to Mendon Ponds

Park and Cumming Nature Center. Because of the high elevation (2,100 feet) at Harriet Hollister Spencer, and as there is no heated shelter, Patrollers quickly learned to "ski or be prepared to shiver", but there is always snow available for Nordic skiing, even when the snow is sparse in the lowlands.

Another successful event this ski season was the annual February full moon Lunar Ski and Hot Dog Days weekend at Cumming Nature Center. During this full moon weekend event, the Nordic patrol sells hot dogs, chili, brownies and hot refreshments. This year's fundraiser was the most successful ever with profits soaring 25% over prior years. Many thanks again to Jim Drew and Mell Gleason for their tireless efforts to organize this event. If any alpine patroller wants to take a weekend off from the slopes and try on a pair of cross-country skis, then Hot Dog Days at Cumming Nature Center is the place to get started.

For those of you who missed it, the Nordic Awards Banquet featured numerous awards, and some important patrol business. Mike Tallon reported on the Nordic Ski Patrol questionnaire, which was sent out to all patrollers, seeking their opinions on the direction the patrol was taking on a number of issues. The Nordic executive board will be meeting to craft a response to the opinions and suggestions received to date, so, stay tuned.

The Nordic summer picnic will happen on July 31st. There will be further communications about the picnic as details become more clear.

Tom welcomed the guests to the Nordic awards banquet including John Lawson, Bill Gamble, and Mike Lord from the Genesee Valley Region; NYS Parks manager Tom Barrile from Stony Brook State Park and Harriet Hollister Spencer Recreation Area; and former Nordic ski patrollers Daan Zwick, Stan Perry and Clyde Glover.

Tom Barrile announced that New York State Parks has agreed to acquire the property adjacent to Harriet Hollister Spencer Recreation Area where a number of outbuildings from a former church camp still stand. These structures have been privately owned until now, but the owner has agreed to sell the property to the State. We hope this marks an end to the "ski or be prepared to shiver" Harriet Hollister patrol shifts by providing a heated indoor Patrol shelter.

Tom recognized Grant Fowler for his work with Nordic candidates. Grant announced that we have four Nordic candidates committed to attend OEC classes this fall. Great job Grant! Geri Cherubim was recognized for her help with public relations, John Benitez for assistance with radios, and thanks were also given to Peter Parker, Brian Schankat, and Jim Drew for being the area coordinators for Mendon Ponds Park, Harriet Hollister Spencer, and Cumming Nature Center respectively. Instructor pins were presented to Mell Gleason and Gina Wyffels; and Deb

Whalen was acknowledged for her assistance with S&T instruction. Certificates were presented to Mike Tallon, Gina Wyffels, Tom Adler, and Deb Whalen for completing PSIA Level I instructor's certification. Grant Fowler, Geri Cherubim, Deb Whalen, Gina Wyffels, Mike Middleton, and Dave DuBreck were congratulated for completing Avalanche and Mountain Travel and Rescue Level 1.

Skip Millor presented the Nordic Ski Patrol awards: The "Tom Adler Lost Patroller Award" for stealth patrolling with both cell phone and radio turned off was earned "without any runners up" by Mell Gleason, who almost had a formal search and rescue called on her behalf when she lost radio contact while patrolling at Cumming Nature Center. It appears that a group of six patrollers upon completing training exercises at Harriet Hollister Spencer were celebrating their triumphs at the Shamrock Bar in Honeoye when they overheard the alert go out. Fortunately, for all involved, Mell was found before the group finished their pitchers and stumbled out into the blinding sunshine to find an out-of-the-way spot behind a tree on the pretext of "looking for the lost patroller."

Skip awarded plaques to Tom Adler, Chuck Crockett, and Jim Drew for skiing the most shifts at Cumming Nature Center; to Deb Whalen and Geri Cherubim for skiing the most shifts at Mendon Ponds Park; and to Charles Feller for skiing the most shifts at Harriet Hollister Spencer Recreation Area. Service recognition awards were given to Mike Tallon, Mell Gleason, and Tom Adler for 5 years of service; Holger Stave was not in attendance to collect his 25-year pin; and the banquet attendees had the pleasure of Mike Tallon showing restraint and limiting his comments to just a few minutes when presenting Skip Millor with his 40-year service pin. award and inscribed with Jim's name as the first of many recipients to be awarded this honor in the future.

The "Charlie Effrige Award for Excellence in Leadership and Achievement in Patrol Work" was awarded to Mell Gleason, for her continued, steady and consistent guidance. We overlooked the fact that she turns off her radio from time-to-time so as to be spared the intrusive calls for 'radio checks.' A plaque was created to commemorate this award and Mell's name will be the first to be placed on the plaque.

Finally, Mike Lord and John Lawson came to the podium to present a White Merit Star from the Genesee Valley Region to Peter Parker for valuable service and assistance by teaching CPR/AED. Mike then presented a National Meritorious Service Award to Skip Millor for his many contributions to the Genesee Valley region over his 40 years of service. ...and, that was that.


